

Doménikos Theotokópoulos; 1 October 1541 − 7 April 1614), a most widely known as **El Greco**

The Cretan-born artist, who spent the years of his maturity in Toledo, in Spain, created the work in about 1600. Most El Greco scholars believe that it was created as part of a multi-panelled altarpiece commissioned for the Colegio de Dona Maria de Aragon, an Augustinian seminary in Madrid for the training of priests. That splendid altarpiece, for which El Greco had received the unprecedented sum of almost 6,000 ducats, was dismantled in 1810, during the French occupation, when Joseph-Louis Bonaparte suppressed the Spanish religious orders. Nowadays, *Pentecost* is to be seen in the Prado Museum, in Madrid. It is one of the masterpieces of the artist's late and so-called "mystical" style – a style memorably dismissed by the eighteenth-century Spanish art theorist, Palomino, as "the Greek's extravagant manner."

Dear Friends, June, 2023

I came to faith while I was a university student. At that time I was part of a very conservative Christian group. I am grateful for what they taught me, and their friendship; however, it wasn't long before I realised I could not remain part of that community.

It was when my small group leader said to me that it was part of God's plan for my dad to die at age 36, leaving two young children and a widow, I knew I had to leave. I determined that I would find another view of Christianity that made more sense to my experience of life.

Fast-foward 30 years, in conversation with a friend who keeps in touch with that group, she stated that at a reunion they were talking about all the people from that generation who went into ministry. 'I added your name to that group,' she said proudly. I guess those present, if they even remembered me, were very surprised. I was probably the last person they expected to be a minister. I was shy, avoided speaking in groups, and lacked confidence. God had ideas for my life that may not have been apparent at that time.

Recently, I have been asked to consider a church role which surprised me. In fact, I laughed out laugh when I was told about. 'You are kidding me!' I said to the person.

I wonder whether you have been asked to do something which surprised you? Have you taken on a role at work that you never expected? Have you done something in your family that was harder than you imagined it would be but you managed, survived, or even thrived doing it?

The life of the church has changed a lot in recent years. We no longer have full-time ministers based in one church--as you well know. I think the church has adapted to this change incredibly well and graciously. But because of this change in church life, there may be times that you are asked to do something that you never expected. Is God asking you to think about what you can offer to the life of the church that you never expected? Is it to take on a role contributing to worship? Is it looking into something practical? It is providing activities for the children/young people? Is it offering pastoral support within the church? Do you have a vision for an activity that might enhance the life of our church or the community?

The Synod has developed a booklet called 'The Whole People of God.' It is, in effect, reminding us that we all have a role to play in the life of the church. Your role, or calling, is essential for us to continue being church and sharing God's love in the community. None of us, me, David, or anyone in leadership, can do it alone. We have to do it together. We are 'the whole people of God.' One of the hymns that always touches me is 'I, the Lord of Sea and Sky.' The refrain is an answer to God's question of who will serve: 'Here I am, Lord. Is it I, Lord? I have heard you calling in the night. I will go, Lord, where you lead me. I will hold your people in my hand.' This is a willingness to answer God's calling with a 'yes'. When you are asked to do something, perhaps you will at least pause to listen for whether this is God's request.

Now, perhaps you are wondering what role caused my surprised response. I was asked whether I would let my name go forward for General Assembly Moderator of the URC. This is a role that is voted on by the members of Assembly in July. While it is not a role I would have every sought, I felt I had to say 'yes' to the initial question. What happens next is determined by those at Assembly.

Are you being asked to say 'yes'? Maybe God has a new direction for you in the whole people of God.

Canton Uniting Church Secretary Annual Report, May 2023

Much of my report last year talked about how, as a church, we were starting to return to normal after over 2 years of living with covid and restrictions. It is so good this year to be able to reflect on our church life where it has largely been 'business as usual'.

We have been able to resume many of the activities that were running pre-covid, and it is great that our buildings are being used so much by others outside of the church, such as choirs, other community groups and for birthday parties. Audrey is kept very busy managing all of this, and we are extremely grateful for her hard work with this as well as tirelessly looking after the church premises.

The Pastorate churches under the leadership of Martha and David have found an increasing number of ways of working together over the past year. Alison and I represent CUC on the Pastorate leadership team and Ceri George is our voice on the Regional Pastoral Committee – groups that meets a few times each year to discuss what is going on in each of the churches and look for ways we can collaborate and support each other. We are also thankful to have the guidance of our ministers.

We have held a few events this year as a pastorate which has helped friendships to develop across the churches, including the 'Big Day Out' reimagined and the Twmpath that were hosted here. More recently, there was a weekend packed full of activities including the Sustainable Fashion Fair in Beulah, the service at CUC taken by Rev Fiona Bennett (the URC General Assembly Moderator) and the 'After the Flood' film and lunch at City. Continuing the practice that began pre-covid, the young people across the pastorate meet up for a day of activities during most school holidays, and it is great to see these friendships blossom. Mid-week Bible studies continue and this year's Lenten series was a blend of online and face-to-face sessions.

In Canton we have held several other events as a fellowship. Last September we hosted a Macmillan Coffee morning, and simultaneously enjoyed a pilgrimage walk around community gardens in the local area. In December, Andrew's musical expertise made for a very memorable Silent Movie Night where a collection was taken up for the work of Cardiff Mind. As a church we continue to collect for Cardiff Food Bank, and made this charity our special focus at key points in the year such as Harvest, Advent and - more recently - on the weekend of King Charles' coronation. On Ash Wednesday we held our first dinner church, and look forward to the second one next week when we will have a family film night with a bring and share meal. We haven't had a gift day event this year and so hope to plan something during the next few months.

As you may be aware, a lot of work goes on behind the scenes and we are thankful for those members I have not yet mentioned whose expertise keeps the church running - there are so many people that have made things happen this year, including:

- Those who look after the technology in church, particularly remembering Richard Edge who has made sure that the equipment for live streaming is up and running, and installing the new projector after the last one died on us.
- Katie Munnik who has taken over our social media on Twitter and Facebook
- Alison Walker and Ceri George who ensure that the safeguarding policies and processes are all in place and up-to-date
- Richard and Alison who recently wrote our Health and Safety policy, and Audrey, Steve and Richard who deal with most of the maintenance issues as they arise
- Everyone who leads worship in the church, and of course Megan who, as our pulpit secretary, never has a rest
- Those who make tea and coffee, welcome us on Sunday mornings, look after the garden,

deacons and officers, Hugh as Newslink Editor and Alan as assistant treasurer... ... the list goes on, and we thank God for them all and their commitment to His work in this place.

I would particularly like to mention Alison as church chair whose role seems to have extended far beyond that which she originally signed up for – genuinely I think the place would grind to a halt without her, so thank you Alison.

During the last year we have been saddened by the loss of dear friends, and in particular we think of our members Mary Jones and Cath Blakemore, and remember with joy the times of fellowship we shared with them.

We delight in worshipping God with old faces and new, we welcome both occasional visitors and those who stay and become friends. Last Autumn were delighted to receive Michael and Katie Munnik into membership and thank God for the contribution their family makes to our Church.

We have heard from many others today about what has been going on and what WILL be going on over the coming months and years. So, let's get excited about the opportunities the future presents, let's get ready to roll up our sleeves and get our hands dirty – both figuratively and literally – as well continue to 'grow' as a fellowship, serving God in this church, and in our Community.

CUC Development Group Report for AGM 21.5.23.

I am pleased to present this report on behalf of the Development Group but had to take a step back during the year to look after Phil. I am very grateful to Alison for ensuring that things continued to move forward.

There was a delay while the Development Group waited for the final costings for the chosen Plan from Caroe and Partners. However, a subgroup was set up to develop the plans for the garden, and this Garden group were able to forge ahead. They have made links with Grow Cardiff and have led the consultation with local people.

We finally received the costings and were able to agree on a Plan which we could afford with the church. We got back some momentum in a Consultation event with our members and the public in October 2022.

At the beginning of this year, on 11th January, we took our Plan to the URC Synod Finance and Property Board and it was well received. At the same time, we began to think about the Council planning application we need to make. Caroe and Partners will put in the application but we have been able to obtain a sketch plan for the new garden from an experienced landscape gardener. We also had a meeting with two of our Canton Councillors, who looked at our building and saw our situation first hand. They were interested and supportive with helpful suggestions.

In the meantime, we have been thinking about fundraising. As things stand, there will be a shortfall of £117K between the amount of funding that we can draw on and the sum estimated by the quantity surveyor. This is a large sum of money and we will need to pull out the stops to raise it, but we do have some confidence that it will be possible. We will not be able to start the demolition until we have raised all the money needed... so that is an incentive to get cracking!

The Deacons supported the idea of employing a specialist fundraiser to scope the project with initial research and identify organisations we can apply to, as well as sending off the applications needed. We are very grateful to Ken Woods who volunteered to co-ordinate the fundraising efforts for us. Thanks very much Ken.

We have started to formulate ideas about what we can do to raise funding within our membership, and this has included a series of musical events; individual contributions and requests for support from our fellow Pastorate churches. So we are hoping that you will all become involved in these efforts, and any ideas you have for fundraising will be very gratefully received.

I want to thank all the Development Group members for their patience and hard work over the past year in helping to get us to this point. In particular, I want to thank Alison, who stepped in to move things forward, and Chris, who has given us his knowledge and expertise over many hours, freely and without payment. A big thank you to them. We are lucky to have them.

As I have said, the deacons supported the idea of using a specialist fundraiser to help us with this project. However, we also need the church to agree. Experience in other churches has shown that the funding raised has justified the investment. We can apply to the URC for funding towards scoping the Project, which is a Grant up to £10K, but we will need to use church funds as well. This is a motion that comes from the deacons so doesn't need a proposer or seconder.

FINANCIAL REPORT FOR ACCOUNTS ENDING 31st DECEMBER, 2022

The account for the year ended 31st December 2023 on the General Account show an Income of £55,989.80 as against Expenditure of £53,007.91, a Profit of £2981.89 for the year.

EXPENDITURE.

- The Overall Expenditure has increased from 2021 by £8500.
- ASSESSMENT. The URC payments have remained static from 2021.
- ADMINISTRATION. This includes the Insurance for the Buildings, this increased slightly in 2022. However it has to be noted that Insurance cost has risen by £750 or 20% in 2023. This section also includes the new Laptop, Wifi Fees, new Sound & Vision Equipment, ROOTS magazines, Baptist Together fees and the necessary Copyright Licences.
- PULPIT COSTS. The majority of this category was recorded in January 2022 relating to Expenses incurred in 2021 of nearly £2000.
- CLEANING. As the Building was back in full use after the pandemic, the cleaning had to be increased to cover the weekly services and use of the facilities. Bills have increased but this was taken into account when the new arrangements were agreed.
- ENERGY. As we were back in full use of the building in 2022 and with higher cost of Gas & Electric, the Expenditure is greatly higher than the previous two years as anticipated. We fully expect the cost of Energy to rise again this year.
- SUNDRIES. This category includes the Youth Group Expenses and contribution to the Children's prizes.

- TRANSFERS. The Charity, Christian Aid and Next Steps items are all contra accounts, i.e. money in = money out.
- BUILDING MAINTENANCE. This category is now a lot lower in 2022, this isbacause in 2021 the main Expenses was the clearance of the Loft area. This category also includes Europest Treatments, Capital Fire for Alarms & Extinguishers, Roof Repairs and Boiler Maintenance.

INCOME

- COLLECTIONS. Most of the Collections are received on a Monthly Standing Order Basis and has increased from 2021 by 10%. If any Church member wishes to make their contributions by Standing Order rather the Good Old Cash, then please see Alan for a form.
- GIFT AID. This continues to be a valuable source of Income, it is claimed on a 3 monthly basis which gives an Annual Income of approximately £7000.
- PREMISES. Our Building has the potential to be another valuable source of Income. In 2021 it generated just £1938 but in 2022 the Income was £6611, this is obviously due to greater access to the facilities following the pandemic. This should continue to grow but we must be aware that any impending Building work could impact on Hire Income. In 2019 (pre pandemic) the Income was nearly £9000.
- DONATIONS. Main source of Donations was from Archer Trust, URC Grants and a donation from Yiping.
- GIFT DAY. This is another valuable source of Income with the Gift Day in February raising £3229, as usual CUC members giving generously.

Growing Together Community Garden Report

AGM 21st May 2023

Just to remind members that an integral part of the development plan is the establishment of a community garden. The current, somewhat ambitious, plan was to a large extent born out of necessity. We cannot afford to rebuild the buildings at the back in the way we had originally wanted. However, the small garden at the side of the church has quietly, gracefully and, I must say, astonishingly, been showing us a different way of realizing our mission to be an open-fronted church. As Marieke Arthur and other members who have diligently watered and tended the garden will tell you, it has become a draw for local people who will walk by and take an interest.

Over the last year we have been working hard to transform a great idea in our heads into one that can work for our church members and our local community (in all its diversity). We have a small group of us who meet up every month (where possible) to develop our vision, aims and objectives as well as establishing policies and procedures to ensure that we proceed safely and have a clear idea of the distinct roles and responsibilities of volunteers. These are taking time as the garden is not separate from the church and some of these overlap. Once established and agreed we hope to open the garden regularly. We have also been attending the quarterly Edible Cardiff network meetings which bring community gardens across Cardiff together to share experiences and resources.

In terms of legal structure, we had discussed repurposing and reopening that of the dormant Treganna Family Centre, but it was felt that there were unnecessary complications in doing this and we need something that is fit for purpose.

There are going to be considerable challenges in transitioning to our new garden. The site is likely to be a demolition site for a while, so it is essential that we capture people's interest now and sustain it over what will be a time of disruption. In terms of involving people now, we intend to host workshops. We hosted a highly successful presentation at the end of last year from a sustainable soil expert and on the 27th May, Sophie Bolton from Cardiff Salad Garden with be helping us to plant and participants will be able to take the fruits of their own labour home. We hope some of you will be able to join us.

Katie Munnik has kindly agreed to support us with her considerable experience in communication through social media. We can also find other ways of reminding people of our existence by posting

ideas and tips as we make the transition from our existing garden to the dream garden of our future.

As reported by Ceri, the emerging plan for a community garden went to the URC Synod Finance and Property Board earlier this year but the garden still needs to be approved by Cardiff Council planning. Our sketch plan gives us the flexibility to be creative in whatever ways our church and local communities wish it to develop. We cannot really proceed with any real fundraising efforts until planning permission has been granted.

Today we are also asking you formally to accept our vision, aims and objectives. Everything we do will be informed by the underpinning vision which is that the garden will be created by the community, for the community, as a place of welcome, learning, peace, sharing and healing and will be a model of biodiversity in the service of our planet. We hope that you will give us your approval today and your continuing support in what looks to be an exciting future.

It was **Christian Aid Week** from the 14th to the 20th of May.

One of the situations Christian Aid is currently responding to is in Malawi, where Cyclone Freddy, the longest-lasting tropical cyclone on record (lasting 34 days), hit both Malawi and Mozambique. This cyclone is the equivalent of a full North Atlantic hurricane season.

Malawi experienced a year's worth of rain during the 4-week cyclone. The number of people affected by the Tropical Cyclone in Malawi continues to rise. Over 508,000 people are displaced and hundreds have lost their lives. There's also an increased risk of malaria and cholera in the immediate aftermath.

Our response

Our partners and team in Malawi have been responding to the immediate recovery needs of communities. This includes:

- Corn soya blend for porridge for breastfeeding mothers and children under 5 years
- Mosquito nets for families to provide protection against malaria
- Providing temporary toilets and bathrooms, water containers and water treatment to help prevent the risk of cholera
- Mobile clinics to help people process the emotional trauma of the cyclone

• Distribution of cash to 1,000 households so that families can purchase their immediate
